Kaia's untitled poem had a well crafted rhythm and sentiment. Isabella and Zoe both wrote exciting and ambitious poems which show great promise for future endeavours. I loved Ellsa's particular take on the popular Tui with some evocative imagery and Harland's poem was dramatic and compelling. Isaac's haiku on the subject of his pet budgie was surprising in the best way, giving me a genuine insight into his relationship with his pet — a remarkable achievement. Taylor's 'Kotare' beautifully demonstrates how a brief poem can effectively capture a moment, while Nico's poem cleverly used repetition to good effect. And Onyu's poem 'Tui' with its wonderful collection of imagery was a beautiful tribute to one of our best loved birds.

There were many wonderful poems and it was an honour to be a part of the judging. However I did see that one student had submitted a poem that wasn't their own work. I think we all agree we would much rather read your own original poems – something to keep in mind for future competitions.
